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



As the City of Calgary attempts to control urban sprawl, new lots are becoming smaller. While a small garden is easier to care for and less time-consuming, it does mean that homeowners have to pack more into their space. One solution is to grow plants that are both ornamental and edible. Fruit trees and shrubs have beautiful blossoms, provide privacy and shade in the garden, and have the added bonus of fruit.

Apple trees are lovely, with white blossoms in the

white flowers and fruit which is excellent for jelly.

spring and fruit in the fall. Many hardy apple varieties

are now available in Calgary. Edible crabapples have

Annual and perennial vegetables, fruits and edible flowers don't have to be grown in their own beds; many are wonderful additions to garden borders and containers.

Don't be discouraged if your garden is rather small in scale.

The Evans cherry has been grown in Alberta since the 1920s and is very hardy in Calgary. Although it is considered a sour cherry, the fruit is delicious fresh and great for cooking.

The University of Saskatchewan has developed dwarf sour cherry varieties—the Romance Series—in shrub form. Like the Evans cherry, they are

attractive and hardy and bear delicious fruit. Nanking cherry is a lovely ornamental shrub commonly grown in Calgary. The small, sweet red fruit is tasty but has

rather large pits, so may be best used for jelly. Honeyberries, or haskaps, are relatively new shrubs on the market. The elongated dark-blue berries ripen in mid to late June. They are excellent

fresh or in preserves. Saskatoon is a North American native shrub with white blossoms in spring and outstanding fall colour. It is often planted as an ornamental shrub or hedge; however, the sweet blue fruit, which ripens around mid-July, is delicious fresh or cooked.

Rhubarb is tough as nails and is ready to harvest early in the spring. It is delicious in baking and preserves, either on its own or combined with strawberries, apples, or berries.

Many herbs fit nicely into garden borders and containers. Chives of the common and garlic varieties have attractive grass-like leaves and pretty purple and white flowers, respectively. Thyme makes a beautiful, edible groundcover; mother-of-thyme is my favourite. At the Calgary Zoo, curly parsley is used as an attractive edging in ornamental borders.

Vegetables can also be pleasing additions to ornamental beds and containers. The quirky-looking perennial walking onion produces flowers and clusters of small onions on top of the foliage.

The tops then fall over, and new plants sprout from the top onions. The greens, top onions, and roots can be eaten. Colourful lettuces, rainbow chard, and kale are lovely additions to garden beds and containers. And for a vertical accent or screen, grow scarlet runner beans on a trellis or fence for bright red blossoms and edible beans in the summer.

Add some edible flowers to your garden beds or containers for a splash of colour and to attract pollinators. Many blooms that we consider purely ornamental are also edible. Some of my favourites are nasturtiums, violas, and daylilies. Plant a few sunflowers for seeds to eat or to share with the birds.

So don't be discouraged if your garden is rather small in scale. No matter what size plot you are blessed with, you can cultivate your own version of paradise.

Note: I haven't listed specific cultivars; it's always best to ask for recommendations from a reputable local garden centre.

Spring Cleaning Tips


Cleaning around the house

The City of Calgary wants to remind you that when you start your spring cleaning around the house, find the right place for your unwanted items:

- Gently used toys, small furniture, and pots and pans: Donate to a local charity. Small broken household items go in your black cart.
- Old paint and cleaning chemicals:
 Take them to a designated fire station or City landfill for safe disposal. Visit calgary.ca/hhw to view locations.
- Clothing, shoes, and linens: Donate useable clothes, shoes, and linens to a local charity or take them to a textiles recycling bin at City landfills.
- Old electronics: Take your old and broken gadgets to an electronics drop-off for proper recycling. Check out the list of locations at calgary.ca/electronics.
- Household batteries: Safely dispose of household batteries by taking them to a participating retailer for free recycling.
 Learn more at calgary.ca/battery.
- Fridge and pantry cleanup: Remove food from packaging and put it in your green cart for composting.

If you're unsure how to dispose of an item, look it up at calgary.ca/whatgoeswhere. And don't forget to clear snow off your blue cart lids and keep the lid closed to ensure that paper and other recyclables stay dry!

Community Projects

Thank you to everyone that helped with donations of food, winter clothing and money to support Ward 5 Winter Food and Clothing Drives. Both were very successful, and we ended up collecting donations worth over \$20,000. Volunteers from the Community and my office staff drove to drop off donations to families in need. A big shout out to the Dashmesh Culture Centre for partnering with us. Donations can still be picked up from their location in Martindale.

Transit Safety

Transit safety is a top priority for my office and we have continuously advocated over the past several months on concerns from residents regarding safety and cleanliness at the transit stations and on the LRT.

The following safety measures have been added:

- Increased transit patrols:
- Enhanced surveillance:
- Establish downtown location for two teams along the LRT lines: and
- Hiring of 808 Calgary Transit employees, including additional sergeant positions, corporate security, and transit peace officers (to partner with the DOAP team) to support the unhoused population.

The Transit Watch program helps patrons report non-emergency safety concerns while riding the Transit system through the text line. The program offers three reporting services: the text line (74100). the phone line (403-262-1000, option 1), and the 'Help' button located at C-Train station platforms.

If you see something, say something. The Transit Watch text messaging tool is available 24/7, and passengers can discreetly text 74100 to communicate with Calgary Transit staff and dispatch officers in real-time. In case of emergencies, always call 9-1-1.

Schedule Changes

Spring service changes will begin on March 20, 2023. Most of the changes being made are adjustments to schedules to improve connections and improve Transit ability to meet schedules.

Transit Hiring

Since mid-January, 400 operators have been hired and an additional 400 will be hired by the end of the year. With a fresh start to 2023, I would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself to you. I am **Const. Amie Furneaux** and I am a 15-year member of the Calgary Police Service. I am currently assigned to the Diversity Resource Team.

The Diversity Resource Team is made up of officers from the Calgary Police Service, each of whom is assigned to a portfolio that represents a diverse community in Calgary. Our liaison officers work with members of these communities to ensure their needs are met and that they are supported by the Calgary Police Service. Within the team, I serve as the liaison officer to Calgary's South Asian Community.

In order to best reflect the needs of the South Asian community, I receive advice from a board of community leaders within the South Asian community who represent you. The South Asian Police Advisory Board (SAPAB) is a group of highly active community leaders who provide me with direction on how to serve South Asians best. I meet with SAPAB monthly and receive advice about how the Calgary Police Service can better connect with the community and build trust.

Community engagement is crucial as a police officer because I believe that to be an asset to the community, we must be a part of the community. I want to ensure

that my engagement with you is meaningful and productive, and that you get the information you need to feel safe and informed. Throughout the year, I plan to give presentations within the community about key issues facing not only the South Asian community, but also all Calgarians, including fraud, domestic violence, basic laws for newcomers, drugs and addictions, and mental health. These presentations and topics have been determined based on advice from the valued members of the SAPAB. The presentations and topics will be assessed throughout the year.

I will also be contributing informative news articles that reflect the values of the Calgary Police Service and provide information on a variety of topics.

Please understand that as a liaison officer I do not investigate anything. If you need to file a police report, call **403-266-1234**. If you need emergency assistance, call **911**.

Throughout the year, the SAPAB members and I will be attending various community celebrations, and I hope to meet you there.

The mission and vision of the project is to provide a safe environment to support individuals, families and communities to live free of violence and



abuse. Through strategic partnerships with service provides, individual and corporate sponsors and all levels of government, our goal for project is to provide a safe facility/environment for women and children to seek the protection they require and receive the help and guidance to have a bright future.

We believe it is every human's right to live without fear of physical and emotional abuse. In partnership with our community, we would like to empower and support women and children to move beyond violence and abuse through the safety of transitional housing, education and outreach services.

This Development is much needed in the NE quadrant and will serve families off all communities, faiths and backgrounds. This project is strategically located close to Saddletowne Circle, Saddletowne LRT station, schools, Genesis Centre and also Dashmesh Culture Centre. Calgary gets more rain than it seems - it just comes all at once! Because of that. rain barrels and other rainwater harvesting devices are useful in Calgary to help you reduce the amount of water you need to use from your tap.

Here are some of the reasons you and your plants will love you for using rainwater!

- 1. Rainwater is chlorine-free
- 2. Rain is at a natural temperature
- 3. This water falls from the sky and is free!

Some options you have for collecting and using rainwater include underground pipes linked to your downspouts and cisterns, but one of the easiest and least expensive ways to get started is with a rain barrel. Green Calgary and many other retailers sell rain barrels throughout the spring and summer, and these can save you over 3.000 litres of water each year!

Food is Expensive!

How do I keep it from going to waste?

Food is getting increasingly expensive, and it can be difficult to balance food freshness and cost. While food storage and leftover use are important, meal planning is the easiest way to reduce the food waste you create and save you money, while helping the environment, too.

Try these simple meal planning tips to help you cut down on food waste:

- Take an inventory of what you have left over before you go to the market: finding ways to use produce and dried goods that you already have on hand can reduce food spoiling.
- Plan around flex days: no plan is perfect and
 if you expect to follow your meal plan every single
 day, it might disappoint you! Making plans for
 meals that are based on frozen or dried foods or
 things you can make ahead of time lets you put off
 those meals until later if something comes up.
- Give yourself space to figure it out: it might be difficult to change routines or try something new and if you get discouraged, you can stop trying before really figuring it out. Give yourself the time and space to try and find what works for you.
 That's your best path to success!

Ever Wonder

What Uses the Most Energy in Your Home?

The easiest answer is likely your clothes dryer if you use one. Drafty windows and electrical outlets will also increase the amount of energy you use in your home when heating and cooling. But there are many items that use small amounts of energy that might surprise you!

Up to 10% of your electricity use could come from what we call phantom or standby power: energy drawn from electronics and appliances even when they're not in active use. You can probably guess some of these yourself, from TV standby modes to computer sleep modes to the small clocks or displays on many appliances. This wasted energy use contributes to your environmental footprint as well as your energy bill.

Limit your energy use by checking your house for leaks, power use, and more! You can find checklists online of what to check, or contact us to borrow an energy self-audit kit. Either way, reducing your energy use is good for you and good for the planet.




Upgraded Fieldhouses at Genesis Centre by Fall 2023

Genesis Centre's indoor fieldhouses are getting a facelift this summer!

The Genesis Centre will be undertaking a \$500k renovation project in 2023 to upgrade it's two fieldhouses in the following ways:

- New pulastic flooring in Field House 2 that is designed to reduce the risk of injury while providing excellent traction. The flooring in Field House 2 will be comparable to those used in our Community and Feature Gymnasiums.
- Field House 1 will feature artificial turf for the Fall/Winter seasons (October-March) and a concrete pad for the Spring/Summer Season (April-September).
- Both fields will feature 8-foot boards, compared to the current 4-foot boards. This will provide more containment for equipment and make for a more enjoyable playing experience. The outer area of the boards will also be made of glass. Thus, creating a quality viewing experience for those enjoying from outside the fieldhouses.



These changes were prompted in part by the necessity for a routine maintenance upgrade, however also because the quality of these fields will be greatly improved. The intention with these changes is to widen the Genesis Centre audience by transforming into spaces that can host more sport and recreational opportunities than before. The changes will create space for new activities to take place at Genesis Centre, such as field hockey, lacrosse, and cricket.



Frequently Asked Questions

When will the new fields be available to use?

The new fields will be available to use as October 2023, pending the project sticks to its timeline. However, we will be taking bookings on the fieldhouses in lead up the completion of the project.

What can you play?

Facility users and rentals' clients can play the same activities they could before, plus several new ones! The pulastic flooring will accommodate new activities such as floor hockey, volleyball, badminton, and other net-based activities. The turf can accommodate the same activities as before as well as lacrosse, field hockey, and cricket with the addition of the glass paneling.

What will the rates be?

We are still assessing what our pricing model will be for these new fields. As a non-profit, we aim to ensure our pricing reflects the accessibility and affordability needs of the community while ensuring the organization remains financially sustainable. Will the rules/conditions of use change for the new fields?




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
