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



Orange Pumpkins, Thanksgiving & Garlic

It's that time of year when thoughts turn to orange pumpkins and Thanksgiving. Frequently, October is the month to do the last of the garden harvesting and yard tidying. But did you know that it is a planting month? In Calgary, October is the month to plant garlic. Fall planting of garlic provides a jump on the garlic growing season and should result in better yields and larger bulbs.

The garlic type to plant is "hardneck" which is cold hardy and performs well in Calgary. It gets its name from the flower stalk (scape) that grows up the center of the bulb and forms a hard stalk when

the plant matures and dries. There are three main kinds of hardneck garlic: Porcelain, Purple Stripe and Racambole. Porcelain has a thick-white papery skin, the tunic, surrounding the bulb and a strong flavour. It stores the best of the hardneck garlics. Purple Stripe become sweeter after cooking and has purple striping on the tunic. Racombole usually has pink to purple colouring in the tunic, is rich in flavour and is the most commonly grown hardneck garlic. It produces beautiful double-curling scapes that are delicious. Within these groups there are many varieties to choose from bearing names such as Music, Chesnok Red and Spanish Roja.

To plant garlic, prepare the bed. It should have light, rich soil and be well-drained. Garlic does well in a raised bed when planted with at least 15 cm of soil between the bulb and an outside wall. Having a well-drained soil is important, otherwise the bulb may rot before spring. Light soil yields readily to the emerging garlic sprout and will make lifting the bulbs next summer easier. As well, light soil usually readily sheds excess moisture. Add compost before planting to give the soil a nutritional boost that the garlic can use when it starts to grow in the spring.

Inspect the bulbs. There should be no signs of mould. If there is mould, cool, damp weather may cause the mould to flourish and grow into the flesh of the clove. Break and remove the outer paper tunic of a healthy bulb and divide it into its cloves. Leave the protective paper on

the cloves. Cloves are planted with the pointed end up and the basal end down. The roots grow from the basal end and the green shoot from the pointed end.

Garlic is a member of the Allium genus, so practice crop rotation to help ensure plant health, and do not plant garlic where garlic or onions were planted the previous year.

Plant the cloves 10 cm deep and space them about 15 cm apart. If the soil is dry, water. Cover the bed with 10 cm of mulch. Dry chopped leaves, straw or grass clippings can be used as mulch. The mulch, by providing an insulating layer, helps prevent the cloves from being heaved out of the soil by the freeze-thaw cycles, maintains the soil moisture content and helps regulate the soil temperature.

If you are growing more than one variety of garlic, place identification labels in the bed. Metal tags may be pricey, but they usually over-winter well. Cover permanent marker ink with clear packing tape to prevent fading. Be sure to supplement the bed markers with a journal notation, then next summer you can check your notes if the labels are unreadable or can't be found.

May you have a wonderful Thanksgiving with family and friends, sharing the harvest from your garden. Perhaps, include planting garlic on Thanksgiving weekend as one of your festive traditions

Indoor Fieldhouses (1 & 2) now open at Genesis Centre!

For the last couple of months, both Fieldhouse 1 and Fieldhouse 2 have been undergoing some major renovations. As always, our priority is to deliver safe, accessible, and high-quality recreational experiences to our community. The decision to upgrade our facilities was driven by the evolving needs of our community, as well as our commitment to providing high-quality services to our clients. We're happy to announce that these renovations have recently been completed and the fieldhouses are now open for community use.

What changed?

- In Fieldhouse 1, new artificial turf was installed for the Fall/Winter seasons (October-March). For the Spring/Summer seasons, this turd will be replaced by a concrete pad, providing a more comfortable and consistent playing surface.
- Field House 2, on the other hand, now has a
 new pulastic flooring that is designed to reduce
 the risk of injury while providing excellent
 traction. The flooring in Field House 2 will be
 comparable to those used in our Community
 and Feature Gymnasiums.
- Both fields also feature 8-foot boards, compared to the original 4-foot boards. This provides more containment for equipment and makes for a more enjoyable playing experience.
- The outer area of the boards is made of strong Plexiglass material, creating a quality viewing experience for those enjoying from outside the Field Houses while ensuring safety is maintained on the inside.

Quick FAQs:

- Q. How many badminton courts will be added?
- A. As the playing surface changes in Fieldhouse 2, 9 badminton courts will be available following the renovation. Alternatively, the newly renovated Fieldhouse 2 will accommodate up to 3 volleyball courts instead. Additional features include field hockey lines, futsal lines, and pickleball lines for alternative play.
- **Q.** Are there going to be curtains separating the badminton courts?
- A. Yes, there will be curtains dividing the courts in fieldhouse 2. Each dividable section can hold up to 3 badminton courts or 1 volleyball court.

Diwali is India's

Most Important Holiday

-and a celebration of good over evil

Observed by more than a billion people across faiths, this five-day festival of lights brings prayer, feasts, fireworks and, for some, a new year.

Diwali is India's most important festival of the year—a time to celebrate the triumph of light over darkness, knowledge over ignorance, and good over evil.

Widely observed among more than a billion people from a variety of faiths across India and its diaspora, the five days of Diwali are marked by prayer, feasts, fireworks, family gatherings, and charitable giving.

For some, Diwali is also the beginning of a new year.

But Diwali is perhaps best known as a festival of lights. Derived from the Sanskrit dipavali, which means "row of lights," Diwali is known for the brightly burning clay lamps that celebrants line up outside their homes.

The dates of this festival are based on the Hindu lunar calendar, which marks each month by the time it takes the moon to orbit Earth. Diwali begins just before the arrival of a new moon between the Hindu months of Asvina and Kartika—which typically falls in October or November of the Gregorian calendar. In 2022, the five days of Diwali begin on October 22, with the most important festival date taking place on October 24.

The meaning of Diwali—and its many legends Diwali is so widely celebrated—it's an important religious festival for Hindus, but is also observed among Jains, Sikhs, and Buddhists—that it has no single origin story. But while each religion has its own historical narrative behind the holiday, they all ultimately represent the victory of good over evil.

In Hinduism alone—which is considered the world's oldest living religion, dating back to the second millennium B.C.—there are several versions of the Diwali story that vary among geographic communities. These, however, are all epic tales of victory won by men who were considered incarnations of the Hindu god Vishnu, regarded as the sustainer of the universe, and whose role it is to restore the balance of good and evil in times of trouble.

In northern India, Diwali commemorates Prince Rama's triumphant return to the city of Ayodhya after 14 years of exile due to the plotting of his evil stepmother—and after a heroic rescue of his wife Sita, an incarnation of the goddess Lakshmi, who had been kidnapped by the rival king Ravana.

In South India, meanwhile, Diwali honors the victory of Lord Krishna over the demon king Narakasura, who had imprisoned 16,000 women in his palace and meted out harsh punishments to any of his subjects who dared stand up against him. And in western India, the festival celebrates Vishnu's banishment of King Bali-whose immense power had become a threat to the gods—to the underworld.

Sikhs, Jains, and Buddhists, three minority religions in India, have their own Diwali stories. For Sikhs, whose religion arose in the late 15th century as a movement within Hinduism that is particularly devoted to Vishnu, Diwali commemorates the release of the 17th-century guru Hargobind after 12 years of imprisonment by Mughal emperor Jahangir.

Jains, whose ancient religion dates back to the middle of the first century B.C. and also shares many of the beliefs of Hinduism, observe Diwali as the day that Lord Mahavira, the last of the great Jain teachers, reached nirvana

And Buddhists, whose religion emerged in the late 6th century B.C. in what some describe as a reaction to Hinduism, celebrate it as the day the Hindu Emperor Ashoka, who ruled in the third century B.C., converted to Buddhism.

How Diwali is Celebrated

Just as the legends of Diwali differ from region to region so, too, do the holiday's rituals. What most have in common, though, are the abundance of sweets, family gatherings, and the lighting of clay lamps that symbolize the inner light that protects each household from spiritual darkness.

But generally, each of the five days of Diwali has its own significance. On the first day of Diwali, people pray to the goddess Lakshmi, bake sweets, and clean their homes—which they decorate the next day with lamps and rangolis, designs made on the floor out of colored sand, powder, rice or flower petals.

Diwali's third day is its most important: On this day, people may go to temple to honor Lakshmi or gather with friends and family for feasts and fireworks. Devotees also set ablaze the lamps they had displayed the day before.

For many celebrants, the fourth day of Diwali marks the new year and a time to exchange gifts and well wishes. Finally, the fifth day is typically a day to honor one's siblinas.

Over the years, Diwali has become India's biggest holiday season—rivaling Thanksgiving or Christmas in the United States. Shoppers take advantage of the sales and communities across India and across its diaspora host small fairs. Fireworks are also a major part of the celebrations, particularly in New Delhi where they are often criticized for causing spikes in the city's notoriously bad pollution. (The city has banned the use of firecrackers in recent years to mitigate these harmful effects.)

However it is celebrated, the spirit of Diwali is universal—the belief that, eventually, light will triumph over darkness.

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


To Rake or Not to Rake?

What to do with all those leaves!

Fall is the time of the year when we marvel at the beautiful colours of the changing leaves but as they gather on our lawns, we are reminded of the tedious task of raking them up. Well, you can save some time and your back because a light layer of leaves left on your lawn is actually good for it. It's also beneficial to the environment for a variety of reasons and here's just a few:

- 1. Many insects and other animals hibernate for the winter in the fallen leaves which act as an insulating blanket and offers protection from the cold.
- 2. These overwintering insects are an important food source for birds.
- **3.** As the leaves break down over the winter, they transform into a natural mulch, which enriches the soil and acts as a natural fertilizer.



Still have extra leaves? Remember you can put them into your green cart for composting by the City of Calgary. If your green cart is full, put the leaves in a paper yard waste bag making sure it is rolled up, weighs less than 20kg and is one foot to the side of your cart. Winterizing Your Rain Barrel

So you've used your rain barrel to collect free rainwater for your yard this year. Well, with a few quick actions to keep your barrel from cracking when the cold weather arrives, you'll continue to save money for years to come!

- 1. Remove the black hose and store it for next spring
- 2. Turn your barrel upside down and drain completely
- Move your barrel to a garage/shed if you can but if you're leaving it outdoors, store it upside down and secure it to prevent damage and water accumulating
- **4.** Reconnect the downspout to allow melting snow to drain away from your foundation

Interested in conserving water and saving money with a rain barrel but don't have one? Rain barrels can save you over 3,000 liters of water each year and Green Calgary will start selling them in April 2024. Changes to Cart Collection This Fall

Starting in November, green cart collection will be once every other week, resuming weekly in the spring.

Here's what you need to know:

- Fill Your Green Cart First: Leaves, branches, grass, and plants can go directly inside the green cart. If it's full, use paper yard waste bags for extra waste.
- Extra Yard Waste Bags: Place them at least 0.5 meters (2 feet) away from your cart.
 Roll the tops closed to prevent spills, and make sure you can lift the bag with one hand.
- No Plastic Bags: They are not allowed in your green cart.

Do You Have Too Much Yard Waste?

You can drop off yard waste free of charge at any landfill from Friday, September 22, 2023, to Saturday, November 4, 2023. Check your schedule at calgary.ca/collection and sign up for reminders. Visit calgary.ca/waste/drop-off/yard-waste for more information and make your yard clean-up a breeze!

Did you know that Waste Reduction Week is October 16 – 21st? Reducing food waste can help you make the most of your food budget, reduce trips to the grocery store and positively impact our community, economy, and environment.

Here are some actions you can take to start saving money, time and food in vour home:

- Use a grocery list and meal plan to avoid buying food you won't use.
- Schedule one day a week to cook from the freezer and cupboard only.
- Label leftovers so they don't become mysteries in the freezer.
- Set aside the fridge's top shelf as a 'leftovers' or 'eat first' shelf.
- Use blemished or unused produce in soup, smoothies, or baking.







